Strategic Plan 2

As we approach the end of our first three-year strategic plan (SP1), it's time to reflect on the status of its implementation and consider the 2012-15 period. While several of the SP1 committees have completed their mandates, others continue to work ... in fact; some of the current priorities will likely carry over for the next phase.

The Board of Directors has approved the following timeframe for the development of a new strategic plan: a survey of partners (February), focus groups in March-April, a draft SP2 (by May), and final SP2 to the Board for approval by June 2012. There will be various opportunities for input through this process in the coming months and you are encouraged to participate to the fullest; the greater the base of contribution, the more likely the priorities and associated action plans will reflect the projected needs of the APSEA community.

Playground

You may have noticed some equipment was recently removed from our playground. We had been advised that some of the items may have been unsafe; accordingly, the pieces of equipment posing immediate safety concern have been removed from the site.

A playground committee has begun the task of planning for the "re-building" of an improved playground facility. This will include design work, and fundraising to facilitate the goal of the project ... to have a safe, state-of-the-art recreational area to serve the children we serve.

Campus Safety and Security

The likelihood that we will retain use of both current buildings makes it appropriate to re-visit safety and security policies and procedures. To this end, we are working with Mark Young, School/Facility Safety Officer of the NS Department of Education to conduct a safety audit. His report will be written to support a phased-in implementation process.

To inform this process, an open-ended survey has been circulated to on-campus staff seeking their input. If you have any issues/concerns and/or suggestions about how to make our campus more safe and secure for students, staff and the general public, please forward same to Pam_Edmonds@apsea.ca by 29 February 2012 so your feedback can be included in our safety audit.

Performance Evaluations

On 27 January, all supervisors participated in a one-day inservice on performance assessment and evaluation. Michael Kennedy of Think Training clarified the principles of performance management, and associated standards, review processes and cycles. Participants, from a range of backgrounds and experiences, indicated the sessions were informative and should assist our efforts to support each other across the organization through performance evaluations.

National Appointment

We are proud to announce that Sheila Bulmer, Coordinator of our Autism Project, has been appointed as an expert member of a new federal Autism Spectrum Disorders Advisory Committee. The committee will develop a national surveillance system for ASD to assist the Public Health Agency of Canada:

- Measure the frequency of ASD and how rates differ across Canada;
- Describe the population of Canadians living with ASD'
- Increase understanding of trends in ASD over time.

While this appointment is recognition of Ms. Bulmer's stature in the field, it also ensures Atlantic Canada will be at the leading edge of significant emerging research and knowledge about ASD. Well done, Sheila!

Rick Hansen Man in Motion Tour

Eric Ravn was chosen as one of 7,000 "Difference Makers" across Canada to carry the Rick Hansen medal in a cross-country relay in celebration of the 25th anniversary of Rick Hansen's Man in Motion World Tour. Not only was Eric singled out as a Difference Maker, but he also received the honour of being the youngest Medal Bearer in the cross-country relay! (Eric is a grade one student.)

Eric's leg of the relay was sponsored by Invacare Canada, a home healthcare company who handpicked Eric as the Difference Maker for one of their three sponsored legs of the relay across the country. Eric was selected by Invacare after they learned how hard he works and the impact he has had on the way those around him look at people with disabilities and at accessibility issues.

Eric carried the medal on Sunday, 2 October 2, 2011 for 250 meters starting at the Sussex Elementary School Sports Field.
